

A monthly update on the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion work happening at NGFS

GUILFORD CAMPUS

- In honor of Indigenous Peoples Day (October 12), A Child's Garden (Preschool) students learned that the word "indigenous" means the first people in a place. We acknowledged that NGFS is on the land of the Sappony, Shakori, and Eno nations. We also read the book "We are Water Protectors" by Carole Lindstrom. A Child's Garden also read "Kamala and Maya's Big Idea" written by Kamala Harris' niece, Meena Harris. They discussed the significance of Kamala Harris being elected Vice President.
- Sunrise (Kindergarten) students
 celebrated our differences and found
 different, beautiful ways to describe
 skin colors. They enjoyed the song
 "The Color of Me" from Sesame
 Street. They mixed paint colors to
 match the colors of their skin and
 painted self portraits. In unit studies,
 Sunrise learned about the pilgrims
 and the Wampanoag tribe and a
 historically accurate explanation of the
 beginning of our Thanksgiving
 traditions.
- As part of their space unit, Rainbow (1st and 2nd grade) students learned about female astronauts and scientists, including Mae Jemison, Sally Ride, and Katherine Johnson. During Meeting for Worship they read "Just Ask", by Sonia Sotomayor, about understanding and appreciating people who are differently abled. They also read "Still A Family", by Brenda Sturgis, about a family experiencing homelessness. Then they made placemats and artwork for the Interactive Resource Center.
- In reading, Horizon (3rd and 4th grade) students learned more about Native Americans by reading a variety of information books, legends, and

- biographies. Students listened to a read aloud of "Encounter," by Jane Yolen. This book tells the story of Christopher Columbus arriving in the Americas from the perspective of a young native boy. Remote and in-person learners met in breakout rooms via Zoom to discuss our thoughts and reactions to this story. They also read and discussed a book about the sad history of the Trail of Tears. The students expressed how it is important to learn about upsetting historical events to help keep them from repeating. The highlight of the fall was creating and sharing Native American dioramas of specific Native American geographic regions.
- Galaxy (5th and 6th grade) students learned about the history of voting rights as part of their unit on Government and Elections. They also talked about the historical significance of Kamala Harris's election as vice president-elect. Current events discussion included the Black Lives Matter movement and protests. Galaxy classroom Meeting for Worship topics included the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment and the life of John Lewis. Morning Meetings topics included Hispanic Heritage Month; they read about women in science and had conversations about gender and gender identity.

- Through "A Celebration of Democracy", Middle School teachers created an experience where students could share their voices in other ways as they are not old enough to vote. Students chose to complete a slide for one of the following:
 - Create a found poem about American democracy out of John F. Kennedy's first inaugural address (15-30 words)
 - Write a brief "This I Believe" narrative about a value or belief that you have about American democracy
 - Pick a song, and a lyric from that song, that you think represents American democracy
 - A statement about your hope for the future of American democracy and how we can achieve it
 - An issue that matters to you and why you think it should matter to other Americans

 provided Upper School students and
 staff with two weeks of her time during
 advisory to work on an activity that
 shared the positive attributes,
 qualities, and strengths that make
 them unique. They discussed how
 they can use those unique gifts to
 illuminate the world. In the next stage,
 students were able to debrief the
 following:
 - Do you feel that the personality quiz identified you well
 - Share why you think this
 - What attributes best fit you
 - Did anything surprise you
 - Based on these results, what do you want your friends to know about you

Other Professional Development:

Our Head of School attended the SAIS (Southern Association of Independent Schools) Webinar: Attracting, Hiring, and Supporting Faculty of Color.

Guilford Campus faculty and staff began working with the Culture Wheel card game by Social Designs. The purpose of the Culture Wheel card game is for players to share cultural practices and identity stories with each other in an interactive way. The game is diversity, inclusion, and belonging in action.

Horizon (3rd and 4th grade) teacher Meg Coscia attended the virtual symposium UnColumbus Day, hosted by the Friends Council on Education (FCE). In the symposium, Meg learned more about the purpose of Indiginous Peoples Day and how to discuss this with students, and how to De-Center Columbus from the traditional Thanksgiving story and from American history. She also learned of additional resources and information to enhance Horizon's Native American unit. These included teaching articles, children's books, and videos that are written from an authentic Native American perspective as well as the Native Lands app that identifies on what tribal nations lands we live so teachers can accurately acknowledge and explore this with the class.
